We have published personal statements from the two candidates for the City Council special election, Laura Downs and John Murphy, in which they introduce themselves and their platforms.

The City Council was away for two weeks at the end of August, giving us time to catch up on past meetings and topics we were researching. City staff presented more design decisions on three bicycle routes along West Street and the East-West connection to Mustang Alley. We also posted on the Community Center HVAC upgrade project and its schedule for closure.

We researched the owners of commercial properties that will benefit from the proposed zoning code amendment to reduce parking requirements to investigate possible conflicts of interest.

We have begun work to understand the background of the Property Yard and the West Falls development. Our first post on this work recounts the Water Wars with Fairfax County that brought about the boundary adjustments, opening opportunities for redevelopment of City-owned land.




<u>Community Center HVAC Upgrading to a Geothermal</u> <u>System, Closing for Three Months in Spring 2025</u>

Proposed parking reductions are now limited to buildings less than 20,000 sq ft. New business tenants can exempt 1,000 sq ft when calculating their parking requirements, although the EDA, Planning Commission, Chamber of Commerce, and ESC favor raising that number.
